*Liriope muscari 'Densiflora'*

#### Description:

A tufted grass like perennial forming a clump of narrow, glossy, dark green leaves; features a beautiful display of lovely lavender flower spikes in mid-summer; best used as an edging plant or massed as a groundcover

#### Ornamental Features

Densiflora Lily Turf features dainty spikes of lavender flowers rising above the foliage in mid summer. Its attractive glossy grassy leaves remain dark green in colour throughout the year. It features an abundance of magnificent black berries in early fall.

#### Landscape Attributes

Densiflora Lily Turf is a dense herbaceous evergreen perennial with a ground-hugging habit of growth. Its medium texture blends into the garden, but can always be balanced by a couple of finer or coarser plants for an effective composition.

This is a relatively low maintenance plant, and is best cleaned up in early spring before it resumes active growth for the season. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Densiflora Lily Turf is recommended for the following landscape applications;

- Mass Planting
- Border Edging
- General Garden Use
- Groundcover

#### Planting & Growing

Densiflora Lily Turf will grow to be about 14 inches tall at maturity, with a spread of 18 inches. Its foliage tends to remain dense right to the ground, not requiring facer plants in front. It grows at a fast rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 10 years. As an evergreen perennial, this plant will typically keep its form and foliage year-round.

This plant does best in partial shade to shade. It does best in average to evenly moist conditions, but will not tolerate standing water. This plant should not require much in the way of fertilizing once established, although it may appreciate a shot of general-purpose fertilizer from time to time early in the growing season. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is somewhat tolerant of urban pollution. This is a selected variety of a species not originally from North America. It can be propagated by division; however, as a cultivated variety, be aware that it may be subject to certain restrictions or prohibitions on propagation.
