



San Marcos Yellow Clivia

Clivia x miniata 'San Marcos Yellow'

Description:

A beautiful bulb plant for the frost free garden or potted to move indoors in winter; glorious clusters of unique yellow blooms with gold eyes, rising above dark green foliage gives tremendous contrast; water more in spring and less in summer or winter

Features & Attributes

San Marcos Yellow Clivia features showy clusters of lightly-scented yellow trumpet-shaped flowers with gold throats at the ends of the stems from late winter to early spring. Its attractive large glossy sword-like leaves remain dark green in color throughout the year.

This is an herbaceous evergreen houseplant with an upright spreading habit of growth. This plant may benefit from an occasional pruning to look its best.

Planting & Growing

When grown indoors, San Marcos Yellow Clivia can be expected to grow to be about 18 inches tall at maturity extending to 24 inches tall with the flowers, with a spread of 24 inches. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 10 years. This houseplant performs well in both bright or indirect sunlight and strong artificial light, and can therefore be situated in almost any well-lit room or location. It does best in average to evenly moist soil, but will not tolerate standing water. The surface of the soil shouldn't be allowed to dry out completely, and so you should expect to water this plant once and possibly even twice each week. Be aware that your particular watering schedule may vary depending on its location in the room, the pot size, plant size and other conditions; if in doubt, ask one of our experts in the store for advice. It is not particular as to soil type, but has a definite preference for acidic soil. Contact the store for specific recommendations on pre-mixed potting soil for this plant. Be warned that parts of this plant are known to be toxic to humans and animals, so special care should be exercised if growing it around children and pets.
