





Suzanne Weigela Weigela florida 'Suzanne'

Description:

A magnificent spring-flowering shrub, featuring showy pink and white trumpet-shaped flowers on the same bush, over attractive foliage that is edged in white; somewhat coarse and open in habit, excellent in groupings; needs full sun

Ornamental Features

Suzanne Weigela is covered in stunning clusters of pink trumpet-shaped flowers with white overtones along the branches in late spring. It has attractive forest green foliage edged in white. The pointy leaves are highly ornamental but do not develop any appreciable fall color.

Landscape Attributes

Suzanne Weigela is a multi-stemmed deciduous shrub with a shapely form and gracefully arching branches. Its relatively coarse texture can be used to stand it apart from other landscape plants with finer foliage.

This shrub will require occasional maintenance and upkeep, and should only be pruned after flowering to avoid removing any of the current season's flowers. It is a good choice for attracting hummingbirds to your yard. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Suzanne Weigela is recommended for the following landscape applications;

- Accent
- Mass Planting
- Hedges/Screening
- General Garden Use

Planting & Growing

Suzanne Weigela will grow to be about 5 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 5 feet. It has a low canopy, and is suitable for planting under power lines. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 30 years.





This shrub should only be grown in full sunlight. It prefers to grow in average to moist conditions, and shouldn't be allowed to dry out. It may require supplemental watering during periods of drought or extended heat. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. This is a selected variety of a species not originally from North America.
