





Phil Parvin Pincushion Leucospermum 'Phil Parvin'

Description:

An attractive, upright shrub featuring long lasting, yellow and orange-red pincushion flowers with pink tips; great for cutting; like most Protea family plants, use very little slow release fertilizer with low phosphorus content

Ornamental Features

Phil Parvin Pincushion features showy yellow pincushion flowers with scarlet overtones and pink tips at the ends of the branches from late winter to early fall. The flowers are excellent for cutting. It has grayish green evergreen foliage which emerges chartreuse in spring. The fuzzy oval leaves remain grayish green throughout the winter.

Landscape Attributes

Phil Parvin Pincushion is a multi-stemmed evergreen shrub with a mounded form. Its average texture blends into the landscape, but can be balanced by one or two finer or coarser trees or shrubs for an effective composition.

This is a relatively low maintenance shrub, and is best pruned in late winter once the threat of extreme cold has passed. It is a good choice for attracting birds and bees to your yard, but is not particularly attractive to deer who tend to leave it alone in favor of tastier treats. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Phil Parvin Pincushion is recommended for the following landscape applications;

Planting & Growing

Phil Parvin Pincushion will grow to be about 6 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 4 feet. It tends to fill out right to the ground and therefore doesn't necessarily require facer plants in front, and is suitable for planting under power lines. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 30 years.

This shrub should only be grown in full sunlight. It prefers dry to average moisture levels with very well-drained soil, and will often die in standing water. It is considered to be drought-tolerant, and thus makes an ideal choice for xeriscaping or the moisture-conserving landscape. This plant should be periodically fertilized throughout the active growing season with a specially-formulated acidic fertilizer. It is not particular as to soil type, but has a definite preference for acidic soils, and is able to handle environmental salt. It is somewhat tolerant of urban pollution. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid.

Phil Parvin Pincushion makes a fine choice for the outdoor landscape, but it is also well-suited for use in outdoor pots and containers. Because of its height, it is often used as a 'thriller' in the 'spiller-thriller-filler' container combination; plant it near the center of the pot, surrounded by smaller plants and those that spill over the edges. It is even sizeable enough that it can be grown alone in a suitable container. Note that when grown in a container, it may not perform exactly as indicated on the tag - this is to be expected. Also note that when growing plants in outdoor containers and baskets, they may require more frequent waterings than they would in the yard or garden.
