



Buddah Belly Plant
Jatropha podagrica

Description:

A deciduous ornamental plant with thick, swollen, silver-gray stems, topped with attractive, large, lobed palmate green leaves; clusters of small, coral red flowers rise above year-round; a wonderful houseplant for an area with bright natural light

Features & Attributes

Buddah Belly Plant features showy cymes of coral-pink star-shaped flowers with orange overtones and gold anthers rising above the foliage from early winter to late fall. Its attractive large crinkled lobed palmate leaves remain dark green in color throughout the year.

This is an open multi-stemmed houseplant with an upright spreading habit of growth. This plant may benefit from an occasional pruning to look its best.

Planting & Growing

When grown indoors, Buddah Belly Plant can be expected to grow to be about 3 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 24 inches. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 30 years. This houseplant will do well in a location that gets either direct or indirect sunlight, although it will usually require a more brightly-lit environment than what artificial indoor lighting alone can provide. It is very adaptable to both dry and moist soil, but will not tolerate any standing water. The surface of the soil shouldn't be allowed to dry out completely, and so you should expect to water this plant once and possibly even twice each week. Be aware that your particular watering schedule may vary depending on its location in the room, the pot size, plant size and other conditions; if in doubt, ask one of our experts in the store for advice. It will benefit from a regular feeding with a general-purpose fertilizer with every second or third watering. It is not particular as to soil pH, but grows best in sandy soil. Contact the store for specific recommendations on pre-mixed potting soil for this plant. Be warned that parts of this plant are known to be toxic to humans and animals, so special care should be exercised if growing it around children and pets.
